MAKING A DIFFERENCE FROM THE SEAT OF YOUR BIKE

More than 20 of our church's young people spent a busy day riding bikes to raise money for the Pathfinder program. They got up early on a Sunday morning so they could leave church by 6 am and head out on the road to join up with hundreds of other young people from around Northern California for a day of bike riding, great food, and fellowship.

According to Melanie Valdez, a 12-year-old from our church who attended her first bike-a-thon this year, it was a wonderful opportunity to meet kids from other Pathfinder clubs. She rode 13 laps on her bike, despite the unseasonably hot day.

Young people from our church not only spent their time riding their bikes and earning sponsor donations for every lap they completed, many of them also volunteered to work at the club's food booth, where they raised additional money. Nearly a dozen adult volunteers from our church helped prepare the gourmet vegetarian dishes available at the food booth, including wontons and fried rice. The adults also made it possible for the young people to travel more than two hours (each way) in order to attend the bike-a-thon, an annual event for all Pathfinder clubs in Northern California.

NEW SPIRITUAL DEFENSE BIBLE CLASS LAUNCHED

A new "spiritual defense" Bible class is now meeting at our church every Saturday afternoon at 2 pm. Led by Charles Reynolds, the class focuses on topics that are pertinent to teens, young adults, and young parents, though individuals of all ages are welcome to attend.

Charles decided to start the class in response to observations that many people have stopped attending church. The class seeks to address the reasons these individuals decide to stop attending, including their discouragement about their inability to live up to biblical ideals, a disinterest in spiritual things, a feeling that the church is no longer relevant to their lives, and their inability to articulate their beliefs to others.

According to Charles, when people can understand and appreciate the depth of God's love for them, from both an experiential and intellectual perspective, they are much less likely to stop attending church. In his class, Charles hopes to provide his students with the depth of understanding they need to articulate their own beliefs about God's love for them and the relevancy of biblical truths to their own lives.



The class is called Holy Jeet Kune Do, a Chinese term that means "way of the intercepting fist." It is a Bible-based "spiritual defense" class that provides students with the Bible knowledge they need to strengthen their faith, despite obstacles and negative pressure from those around them.

THOUGHTS FROM OUR PASTOR

College teachers are perplexed with large numbers of students who cannot feel moral outrage at anything evil. For example, they don't like the Holocaust that took place in Nazi Germany, but they won't say that killing millions of people was wrong. Between 10% and 20% of these students say that killing these millions of people was "a matter of personal taste or preference, not moral judgment."

"Of course I dislike the Nazis," one student told the professor, "but who is to say that they are morally wrong?" Some students also refuse to condemn human sacrifice, because, they say, the Aztecs did it, and who is to judge them morally? Slavery is unfortunate, they add, but we can't say it's wrong!

They have been educated to believe that "no one has the right to criticize the moral views of another group or culture." Another teacher asked the class if human sacrifice was wrong. One woman said, "I really don't know. If it was a religion of long standing . . ." Shades of paganism! The teacher was stunned at this lack of moral outrage about anything.

To those who know we are living in the time of the end, this sad news is not surprising. We are repeating the days of Noah before the flood. But somewhere there should be an ark of safety where right is clearly distinguished from wrong, where truth is clearly distinguished from error.



That ark of safety is the remnant church. It should be a place where truth is positively, firmly confessed. But the same nihilism that is permeating society is trying to permeate the church so that many members have no firm convictions about the truths that made this church to be what it is. Anything can be "truth," for it's relative.

One of our church members, George Edwards, faced some challenging circumstances in recent months, and he took the time to share how his faith in God made all the difference during this difficult journey.

In November 2009, I had my annual medical exam, which revealed some concerns. Further tests indicated that I needed surgery for my colon, as well as my prostate. After prayers by my family and consultation with physicians, it was agreed to tackle the colon first and later the prostate.

On February 13, 2010, during a service at our church, I was anointed by one of our elders and received prayers from Pastor Penno, elders, and our church family. Just three days later, on February 16, surgery on my colon was successful. With follow-up checks confirming the positive results from the surgery, I decided to tackle the prostate issues.

On July 7, Elder Manuel Castillo and Youth Director Josh Mura came to my home. They prayed and anointed me. In the evening, before our mid-week church service, each elder had a special prayer for me in the church office. This was an emotional occasion for me. I felt their love, their care and well wishes, and the power of prayer.

On July 9, I underwent treatment for my prostate. All prayers were answered. There were no complications from the one-day procedure. I entered the hospital in the morning (accompanied by my wife), and we left in the afternoon.

I praise God for the outcome of both procedures, and I feel blessed to have good health. I am also thankful for all of the people who prayed for me, including my family, friends at our church, and people at other churches.
